SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS

As needed, refer to the Order of Worship and Resources at solanabeach.church for sermon video, message outline, and small group questions print version.

CONNECT WITH EACH OTHER

Before beginning your time in John and the message, consider going around and sharing how you experienced the retirement celebration in worship and party on the patio?

CONNECT WITH GOD (Use the below practices or choose one from a previous week. This week's practices are from Everyday Connections Year A, ed. Heidi Haverkamp.)

- **Weekly Examen** Alone: Spend time in prayer, quiet reflection and journaling, following the steps below.
 - o Take a quiet moment, seek our God's presence, and pray for the guidance of the Spirit.
 - o Consider the past week-recall specific moments and feelings that stand out to you.
 - o Choose one moment or feeling for deeper examination, thanksgiving, or repentance.
 - Let go, breathe deeply, and invite Christ's love to surround and fill you in preparation for the week ahead.
 - o End with the Lord's Prayer.
- Lectio Divina Alone: Read Psalm 23 and underline a word or phrase that especially grabs your attention. Pray from that word or phrase and ask God to help you connect to its particular invitation for you this week.

CONNECT WITH EACH OTHER

Together: Read John 10:1-18

- Before digging into the scripture and message more, <u>pray together</u>.
 Ask the Holy Spirit to illuminate and enlighten, and to speak to each one of you through the passage.
- <u>Alone</u>: Briefly spend time alone, considering the passage. Reflect on the question below.
 - o What connections have you made between John 10:1-18 and the world beyond Scripture?
- <u>As a whole group</u>: Around the circle, share your personal reflections and questions about the passage. Encourage one another to engage curiosity, confusion, or bigger questions.

CONNECT WITH SCRIPTURE

If needed, read the passage again. Then select the best questions or customize the questions for your group.

- Review the main points from the sermon outline.
- How are you reflecting on the message from Sunday?
- What connections have you noticed between John 10:1-18 and other passages from Scripture?
- What contrasts does Jesus set up in the parable in verses 1-5?
- How might we-as Jesus' sheep-learn to be more attentive to the voice of our shepherd?
- What attribute of the "good shepherd" does Jesus repeat three times in verse 11-18? Why?
- What parallels, similarities, and differences do you see between the context of the passage and our context today?
- Is there anything in John 10:1-18 that you will continue to wrestle with and explore?

ENGAGE AND EXPLORE

Together: explore the quote below, in connection with John 10.

"The text also makes clear that while the church must employ capable women and men to shepherd God's 'flock,' ultimately, there is only one shepherd: Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior..., and the task of God's appointed shepherds here on earth is to lead the flock to its one true Lord, in whom we find abundant life (v.10)." - Ruben Rosario Rodriguez

PRAYER

Along with prayers of intercession for one another and the world, pray this prayer together: "Jesus, holy gate, you came that we might have life; make me your shepherd that I will know your voice and guide others—and also myself—to your abundant pastures."
