# Matthew 6:19-24, 33 (NIV)

<sup>19</sup> "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. <sup>20</sup> But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. <sup>21</sup> For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

## SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS

**CONNECT WITH GOD** (Select the below practice or choose a practice from a different week.)

- Scripture Meditation: Reflect on God's generosity in a time of stillness, allowing for silence and cultivating an awareness of God's presence with you in this spacious moment.
  - o After a time of silence, receive the words of <u>Psalm 145</u>.
  - Meditate on the passage (it may be helpful to choose one phrase or verse as your focal point)
  - o In a continued posture of openness, meditate on God's generosity to you.
  - Ask the Spirit to saturate your heart with the generosity of God.
    End your prayer with silence, once again cultivating an awareness of God's presence with you in this spacious moment.

#### CONNECT WITH EACH OTHER

Before beginning your time in the message and scripture passage, consider asking each person to share what the word 'stewardship' means for them. For example: Is it an unfamiliar word? Or is it a word that is familiar but has lost some significance for you?

### TIME FOR PERSONAL AND SHARED REFLECTION

- Alone: Read Matthew 6:19-24,33. Offer an extended time for personal, quiet reflection. Reflect/journal on one or more of the following prompts:
  - What does it mean for you to live from your heart?
- **Together:** in pairs or smaller groups: Share your reflections from your time of journaling. Remember to listen with intentionality, and resist the temptation to fix or give advice.

## **CONNECT WITH SCRIPTURE**

If needed, read the passage again. Then select the best questions or customize the questions for your group.

- Review the sermon outline.
- Which part of the sermon feels most applicable to your life?
- How does Matthew 6 frame your understanding of stewardship and generosity?
- What's the scripture context? Where is this passage located in Matthew?

- Consider together verses 21-23? How does the imagery help you connect to your own life in Christ?
- Where does your heart most connect to the words of Jesus here?
- What does the 'heart' refer to in biblical language (v.21)?
- What does this passage teach you?
- What everyday choices or behaviors reflect storing treasures on earth versus in heaven?
- How does good stewardship reflect love for God and love for others?

#### **ENGAGE AND EXPLORE**

<u>Together</u>: explore Revelation 2:4 together, in connection with the passage and message.

"Yet I hold this against you: You have forsaken the love you had at first."

#### **PRAYER**

Read the prayer by John Calvin and then pray with the below prayer (the bold should be read in unison). Make room for the movement of the Holy Spirit as you pray, adding specific prayers after each petition.
